

FELLOWSHIP PURPOSE



The purpose of the IBWS investigative reporting fellowship is to provide journalists, who are currently not in investigative units, in-depth techniques from some of the most accomplished investigative reporters and editors in the field.

Through the Society covering travel and lodging expenses, and confirming employer requirements, this fellowship is designed to eliminate most barriers that will prevent a viable candidate from attending.



REQUIREMENTS

REQUIREMENTS

Applicant requirements

- Be a U.S.-based print, broadcast, online or multimedia journalists with 3-5 years of professional news reporting experience.
- Complete the application to its entirety.
- Attend all workshop sessions in Atlanta, GA.
- Confirm with their employer that they will be allowed to participate in the fellowship program and that their investigative work produced during the program will be published.
- Freelancers can apply, but they must have a news organization willing to write a supportive statement and publish their work.

Employer requirements

- Allow participants to continue to earn their salaries while taking part in trainings in Atlanta without incurring vacation penalties. There will be four trainings at least a weeklong, from February through July.
- Provide support and guidance to the participant as they take part in the program and develop a project.
- Publish the project.

TIPS TO GET THE GREENLIGHT



- You are bringing new skills back into the newsroom.
- You are providing a pre-approved and completed project back to your newsroom.
- You can provide a calendar in advance to help with scheduling.
- Thoroughly flush out your project idea (and updates between fellowship weeks) with your editor or news director to ensure everyone is on the same page.
- Think about how your project can be used across platforms.

- Please include the following in your application:
